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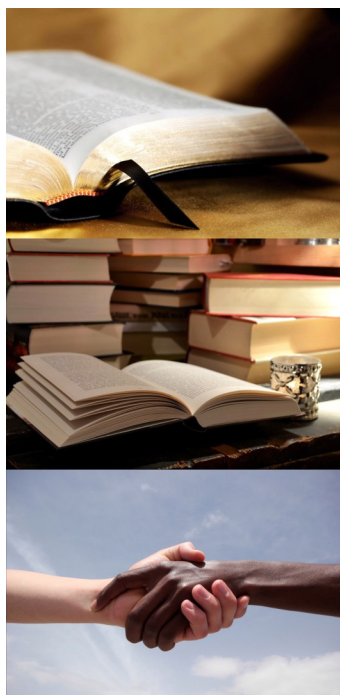

Georgia School of Theology (GST) entrusts the word of God to faithful men able to teach others to live the book of life, growing the Kingdom of God in Georgia and the South-eastern United States.

Mission Statement

The Georgia School of Theology (GST) operates as a non-profit educational institution in association with the Georgia School of Preaching and Biblical Studies (GSOP) and the churches of Christ. GST provides college-level Bible and leadership instruction to train preachers, teachers, and leaders to faithfully serve in the Lord's church. While all of GST's staff are faithful members of the body of Christ and represent our Lord's church in faith and practice, GST is not the church.

The mission of GST includes:

1. Thoroughly prepare sound preachers, teachers, and leaders to meet the local church's needs and challenges in Georgia and the Southeastern United States. GST teaches the skills needed to biblically lead from the pulpit, classroom, and home. Students will receive comprehensive instruction in the Bible, its history, languages, hermeneutics, public speaking, writing, teaching, counseling, technology, and outreach.
2. Defend the Bible as God's verbal, plenary-inspired word against false teaching. Our instructors steadfastly affirm and teach the authority and inspiration of God's word.
3. Provide leadership training to strengthen the churches of Christ in GA and the Southeastern United States to meet the biblically mandated leadership expectations.
4. Assist sound congregations with establishing faithful assemblies to grow Christ's Kingdom in GA and the Southeastern United States.

Aims

Georgia School of Theology (GST) goes beyond knowing the book of life with an emphasis on living the book of life. Graduates of GST will gain critical thinking skills in understanding, communicating and connecting with souls to lead them in the words of life. GST students will profit from sound teaching, scholarly depth, and servant-lead leadership.

Soundness

The Psalmist bemoans that there is no soundness in his flesh (Ps 38:3, 7), beseeching God to save him (Ps 38:22). Soundness (מְתוֹם - mētōm) is a state or condition free from damage or decay. The Georgia School of Theology (GST) provides sound biblical teaching from every Bible book. Graduates will have attained in-depth biblical knowledge from 168 semester hours in OT Bible, NT Bible, and other coursework necessary to deliver faithful and persuasive sermons, teach at all levels of need, and build lasting connections with the congregation and community.

Scholarship

Paul wrote that he counts all things dung (KJV) for the surpassing value of knowing Jesus Christ (Phil 3:8). Thus, all things are considered as worthless (σκύβαλον – skubalon) compared to knowing Christ. GST graduates will attain a high academic level of knowledge and skill for the sake of Christ and His kingdom. Graduates will attend 2,760 hours of scholarly instruction and hands-on service, emphasizing the faithful, practical, and well-rounded application of Scripture for everyday ministry. Beyond the sound biblical knowledge gained from every OT and NT book, GST graduates will have 16 specific preacher preparation classes designed to help the minister and his family succeed in the ministry for Christ.

GST also provides intensive study in the biblical languages and their proper use, providing the minister with the tools necessary to teach others to discern truth from error. GST students will be able to expand their knowledge and skills in an area of their choosing, specializing in Apologetics, Leadership, or Missions.

Sound, knowledgeable, and experienced GST instructors from across the brotherhood provide the best education available. Instructors have years of preaching and teaching experience. In addition to their extensive practical experience, they have attained high scholarly achievements with graduate and terminal degrees, bringing a greater scholarly depth to the classroom while remaining faithful to the inerrant word of God.



Service

We are reminded that as we have opportunity, we are to do good to all, especially to those who are the household of faith (Gal 6:10). Instructors and students at GST labor (ἐργάζομαι – ergazomai) toward the benefit (ἀγαθός – agathos) of others – to promote the well-being of others.

GST emphasizes servant-lead leadership demonstrated in sacrificial-discipleship. Students and staff are encouraged to minister to others. A minimum of three-weeks each year are set aside to focus on servant-lead ministries, both domestic and foreign (e.g., door-knocking, Bible studies, supporting the ministerial needs of various congregations, mission trips, etc.).

Students will learn to effectively and powerfully use technology as part of their ministry. The GST-TV studio will help students' critique and polish their skills and enable them to use various social media vehicles as an edification, educational, and outreach tool.

GST is dedicated to helping congregations to grow spiritually and physically. GST is committed to work with sound congregations to strengthen existing congregations and establish new assemblies of our Lord's church. GST provides leadership training and support for congregations to grow in accordance with God's design. GST staff and students will connect with GA and Southeastern congregations to offer encouragement, ministerial support, leadership training, counseling, and conflict resolution.

Location

The Georgia School of Theology (GST) is located in Houston county's center, easily accessible off I-75 in Warner Robins GA, near Robins Air Force Base, and just ninety-miles from the Atlanta airport.

Facilities

GST classrooms, library, and the GST-TV are currently located at the Warner Robins church of Christ facility located at 1947 Watson Blvd., Warner Robins, GA 31093. Classrooms are outfitted with audio, video, and internet capabilities. The GST-TV studio includes digital cameras, teleprompters, lighting, foreground and background equipment, a green screen, and more. The GST Library consists of hundreds of resource materials and computer access to Logos Bible Software.

Board of Directors

The Georgia School of Theology (GST) is governed by existing and past elders at the Warner Robins church of Christ.

Board of Advisors

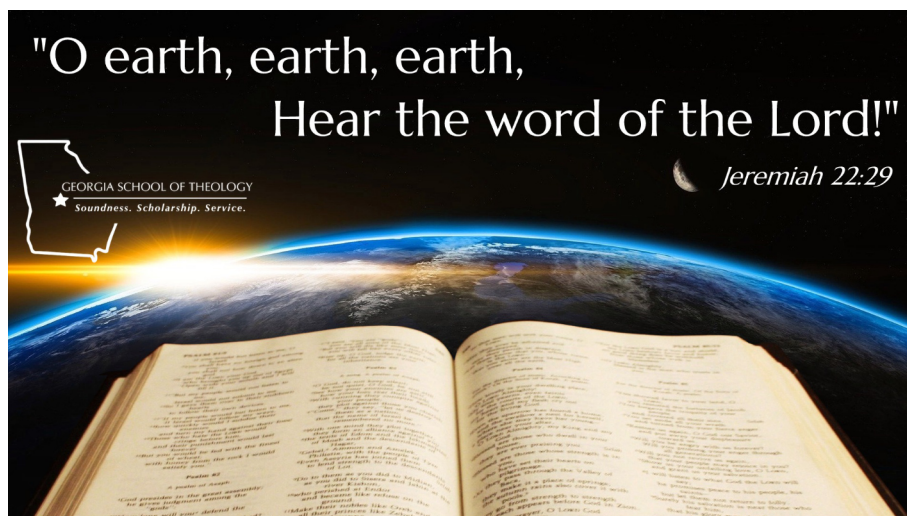
Georgia School of Theology (GST) accesses the best educational, doctrinal, prolific, and experienced leaders in the church of Christ to advise and guide GST's overall direction, curriculum, policies, procedures, and more.

Staff

Georgia School of Theology (GST) management team consists of the Director, a Director of Development, a Registrar, and an IT Specialist. The Director is responsible for the daily operations of GST and oversees all staff and student issues. In addition to assisting the Director with daily operations, the Director of Development focuses on student recruitment and fund-raising. The Registrar handles all student registration, student information, permanent records, and student databases. The Registrar also works in conjunction with the IT Specialist to ensure a smooth operation of all GST technological capabilities. The IT Specialist is responsible for the set-up, operation, updates, and continued maintenance of all GST technical capabilities.

Instructors & Adjunct Instructors

GST utilizes faithful Christians, who bring a wealth of knowledge, an outstanding resume' of academic preparation, a legacy of faithfulness and diligence in ministry, and a deep love and respect for the church and the Scriptures. Most GST Instructors hold graduate degrees, with some having earned terminal degrees in their respective fields. GST faculty are responsible for all classroom instruction, testing, student assessment, grading, and coordination with the GST Director to resolve student issues. GST Student Conduct and Discipline

Students may receive disciplinary action for any conduct that constitutes a hazard to others' health, safety, or well-being. A student may also receive disciplinary action for conduct that is detrimental to the interests of GST. Damaging and/or stealing any GST property or personal property of others will result in replacement or restitution of property, fines, disciplinary action, possible suspension and/or legal action.

Students are expected to be respectful and cooperate with all faculty, staff, and those acting under faculty/staff authority. This includes providing information concerning violations of any rules or policies.

Dress Code

The appearance of all GST students must be consistent with Christian character.

- Students are required to dress with button down or polo style shirts and slacks in class. No jeans, shorts, T-shirts, sandals, or flip-flops are allowed.
- Coat and tie are required when speaking during chapel time, during the PTP Practicum, and at some discipleship service activities.
- Students cannot dress in outlandish styles or wear excessive jewelry that draws attention to themselves and distracts from their Christian mission.



Honesty

Students are expected to exhibit honesty at all times with GST staff, faculty, and students. Failure to do so (including omission of relevant information) will result in disciplinary action being taken, up to and including the possibility of suspension.

Alcohol Policy

The use of alcohol is prohibited. Alcohol use includes the purchase, consumption, and/or possession of alcoholic beverages. Students in violation of the alcohol policy may be subject to suspension for at least one semester, effective immediately.

Drug Policy

Use and/or possession of illegal drugs and/or drug paraphernalia and prescription medicine abuse are strictly forbidden. Students in violation of the drug policy may be subject to suspension for at least one semester, effective immediately.

Violence

GST has a zero-tolerance policy against violence. Students in violation of the violence policy may be subject to suspension for at least one semester, effective immediately.

Sexual Activity Outside of Marriage

All forms of premarital sex arising from sexual relations between consenting adults, of any gender, is prohibited and subject to disciplinary action up to and including suspension.



Non-Discriminatory Policy

The Georgia School of Theology (GST) does not discriminate based on race, color, nationality, and/or ethnic origin in its educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship, or other school-administered programs. GST accepts students of any race, color, nationality, and ethnic origin. All the rights, privileges, programs, and activities are generally accorded or made available to all GST students.

Entrance Requirements

Eligible students include any male student of good character and right purpose, who is willing and able to do the work prescribed by the administration and faculty. Given the intensive and accelerated program, only men with a degree of maturity should enroll. GST students must be emotionally, socially, and spiritually sound. GST students must be proficient in English.

Process

GST candidates need to apply sufficiently early that all references may be received and checked before registration day (August of each year). The application form is on our website at gst-edu.org/enroll. References should address the applicant's emotional, social, and spiritual stability. All students must complete an interview (either in-person or by phone) with the GST Director or the Director of Development.

Full-time students must take 30 hours of weekly online or in-person instruction and will not be allowed to work at secular employment. Students will be responsible for their own support and transportation. International students must have a letter of acceptance from the school and a student permit to satisfy U.S. Government requirements before entering the country and the school.

All students must sign the agreement included in the application to do all assigned work without unauthorized assistance. New students cannot begin after the foundational courses have been in session three weeks.

Enrollment Period

Enrollment is in August of each year. Students cannot begin classes after the first semester of each academic year.

Holidays

The GST holiday schedule includes six (6) weeks off and Labor Day:

Grading System

The Georgia School of Theology utilizes a standard grading assessment as follows:

A - 90-100

B - 89- 80

C - 70-79

F - < 69

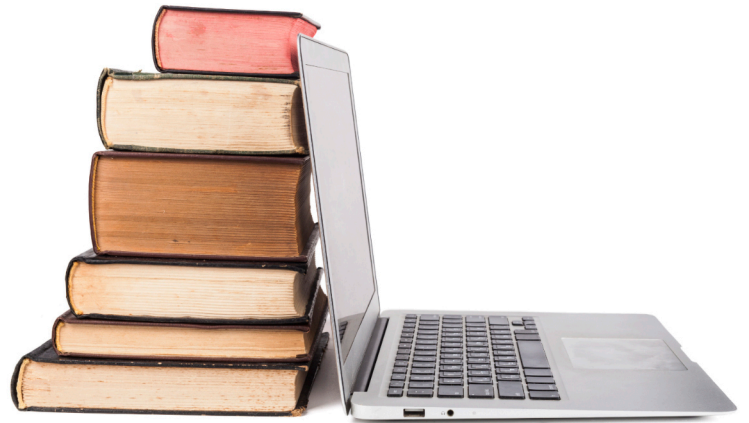
I - Incomplete

A grade of "I" (Incomplete) may be erased from a student's permanent record upon completion of class work and assignments within a period specified by the director. If such requirements are not met, the student will receive a final grade of "F" (Failing) for the course.

Attendance

Classes meet Monday through Friday for three (3) to six (6) hours per week for each course. Each student is expected to be in his respective class on time at every session. All necessary tardiness or absence must be arranged for with the Director and respective instructors, to be governed as follows:

- Leave of absence may be granted to students under conditions beyond their control, such as road hazards, weather conditions, sickness or death in the family, necessary business (official and representing the school). Military leave is recognized and excused.
- No absence is permitted except as indicated in the above paragraph. Each case will be reviewed by the Director and faculty members. Anyone whose attendance is determined to be unsatisfactory will be dismissed.
- Being late for class will not be tolerated, except in emergencies. Three (3) times tardy equals one unexcused absence. Three (3) unexcused absences will result in the student's dismissal.
- Each student is held accountable for work missed due to absence for any reason, and will be required to make it up, according to demands of his respective instructor. In view of the intensive work and accelerated program of the school, any student missing as much as two weeks' total in any one session may be asked to withdraw.



Veteran Policy

GST is pursuing approval from the Georgia Department of Veteran Service for veteran education benefits.

Semesters

GST operates on a semester-based academic calendar. There are two (2) fall semesters and two (2) spring semesters. Each of the fall and spring semesters consists of eight weeks (8) of foundational instruction and two (2) weeks of accelerated classes, service, and/or practicum activities. Each of the foundational classes encompasses forty-eight (48) hours of classroom instruction (6-hours/week). Upon completion of a foundational class, the student earns three (3) academic credits.

Associated with each of the fall and spring semesters are two (2) one-week (1) accelerated classes, service and/or practicum activities. The accelerated courses are one-week (1) of intensive classroom instruction. Completion of accelerated courses earns the student two (2) academic credits.

The three (3) annual one-week service activities focus on servant-lead domestic and foreign ministries. Additionally, students will attend and learn from some of the best brotherhood teachers during the one-week practicum at Polishing the Pulpit (PTP). Service and practicum weeks consist of thirty (30) hours of ministry and learning. Completion of each service and practicum earns the student one (1) academic credit.

The summer schedule includes six (6) one-week accelerated classes. Each accelerated course is thirty (30) hours of classroom instruction and earns the student two (2) academic credits.

Degree Awards

Students who complete the 168 semester hours of curricula will have earned a Certificate of Biblical Theology with a minor in Apologetics, Missions, or Leadership.

Accreditation

GST is not currently accredited but intends to pursue accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE). The ABHE is an institutional accrediting body recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation and the U.S. Department of Education.

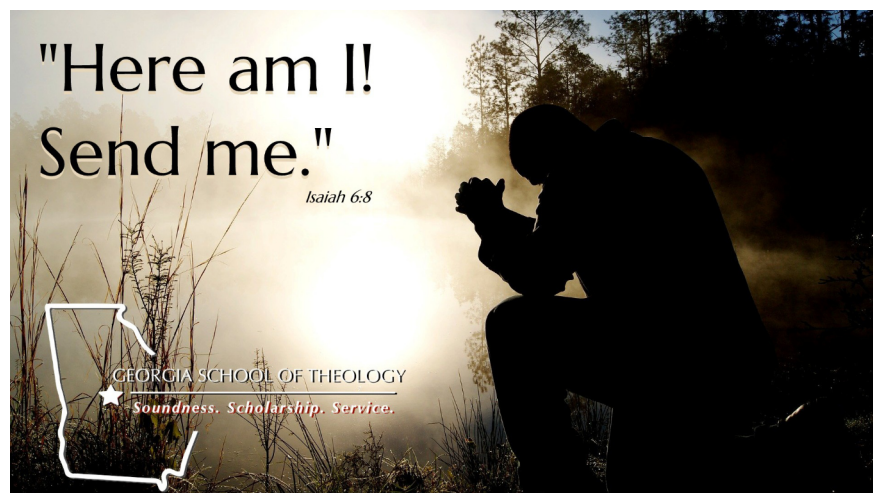
Transcripts & Transfer Credits

GST seeks to maintain educational standards that are equitable to any undergraduate institution of higher learning. Our credible standing in the academic community for all course offerings, certificate programs, and level of instruction is a paramount concern of our school.

GST will maintain active Articulation Agreements and Memoranda of Understanding with colleges and universities affiliated with churches of Christ. These institutions are the most likely recipients of our graduates and former students who seek to transfer their credit hours and course work.

Reciprocally, GST accepts on a per case basis credit hours earned from selected schools of preaching and other institutions of higher learning. Credit hours accepted in transfer must align with GST course curricula and academic standards and must be approved by the office of the Director.

Requests for Official GST Student Transcripts should be directed to the Registrar. Please allow sufficient time for these requests to be processed.





Tuition and Fees

There is no charge for tuition. All the administration and instruction costs are to be covered by the Georgia School of Theology (GST) and other supporting Christians. Students are expected to provide for his living expenses, transportation, books, and materials.

Refunds

Since there is no charge for tuition or any other expenses connected with instruction, there is no need for a refund policy. Books are not subject to refund.

Student Tablets

All GST students will be issued for their use while attending GST, a tablet with access to a word processing software and Logos Bible Software. Students must sign for these tablets and return them in good working condition upon completion or departure from the school.

Financial Aid

A limited number of scholarships are available to help qualifying students with living expenses while attending school full-time. Anyone desiring to receive financial assistance should complete an application by contacting the school Director or the Director of Development.

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GST Curriculum

GST Student Life

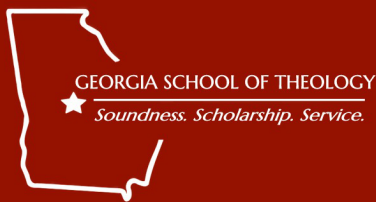

GST Course Descriptions

Old Testament Course Descriptions

OT102 Introduction to the Old Testament 3 Semester Hours

An overview of each book in the Old Testament, studying the following for each: authorship, date, purpose, a brief outline, themes, expanded outline, and how each book fits into the overall scheme of redemption. Each book will be placed in its historical and cultural setting. Attention will be given to a study of the canon of the Old Testament and provide students an opportunity to reflect on how we can integrate scholarly perspectives with a conviction that the Old Testament is the word of God.

OT104 Genesis 3 Semester Hours

This course aims to provide students with an understanding of the content, themes and structure of the book of Genesis. This will be a textual study of the book of beginnings with emphasis paid to creation, the lives of the major patriarchs, the beginning of Israel and the grand scheme of redemption. Students will be exposed to critical methodologies in the study of the book.

OT 105 Exodus 3 Semester Hours

The course provides a textual study of the book in its literary, historical and theological dimensions. Content includes introductory material, textual outline, thematic concerns, and enduring principles. Effort will be given to tracing the use of parallels and motifs throughout the rest of the Bible.

OT 106 Leviticus 2 Semester Hours

The course addresses the composition, contents, purpose, theme and background of the book and its relationship to the other books of the Pentateuch. Effort will be given to tracing the use of parallels and motifs throughout the rest of the Bible.

OT 107 Numbers 3 Semester Hours

A survey on the general understanding and historical background on the study of the book of Numbers. The course addresses the composition, contents, purpose, theme and background of the book and its relationship to the other books of the Pentateuch. Effort will be given to tracing the use of parallels and motifs throughout the rest of the Bible.

OT 108 Deuteronomy 3 Semester Hours

This course provides an in-depth overview of the key topics, themes, and theological emphases of the book of Deuteronomy. It will undertake a study of the ways in which its composition, contents, purpose, and background relate and fit into the to the other books of the Pentateuch. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of interpreting individual passages in light of the narrative setting, the genre of the individual passage, and how they fit into the other books of the Pentateuch. Effort will be given to tracing the use of parallels and motifs throughout the rest of the Bible.

OT 109 Joshua, Judges and Ruth 2 Semester Hours

Joshua, Judges, and Ruth form a unit of three books linking the history of the Pentateuch with the history of the monarchy. This course will examine these books in their historical, canonical, and theological contexts. It will study them and the period from the conquest of Canaan and the period ruled by the judges.

OT 110 I & II Samuel 3 Semester Hours

This course will provide a general exposition of the books of Samuel. Emphasis will be placed on the book's role and purpose in the life of ancient Israel, along with appropriate applications to believers' lives today. Attention will be paid to its major characters Samuel, Saul and David.

OT 111 I & II Kings and I & II Chronicles 3 Semester Hours

A study of the historical background, composition and message of Kings and Chronicles with attention to the supplemental books and parallels or harmonious passages with the books of history. The course will study the divided kingdom, the captivity, and the restoration periods. Our primary goal is to know the text, but historical and introductory data which may help to enlighten it are also emphasized. The course will explore the successes and failures of this dramatic period, teach and apply, where appropriate, invaluable lessons arising from the books.

OT 112 Ezra, Nehemiah and Esther 3 Semester Hours

An exegetical interpretation of Ezra, Nehemiah and Esther in their historical context, showing God's provision for His people as He brings them out of captivity and re-establish their land. It attempts a study of the history, background, and culture of the period covered by the books. Practical applications from the books will be made.

OT 113 Isaiah 3 Semester Hours

This course will give a textual chapter by chapter overview of the message of Isaiah with an emphasis on Israel's spiritual condition, in light of the historical and literary setting of the book. Special emphasis will be placed on the call of the prophet, the Messianic prophecies, including the servant songs, and God's unfolding Scheme of Redemption through the coming Christ and His Kingdom. An examination of how Isaiah cover the historical period from the fall of Israel to the fall of Judah, Jerusalem and the temple will also be studied.

OT 114 Jeremiah and Lamentations 3 Semester Hours

A textual study of the content and prophetic of the message of the prophets for Jeremiah's own day and in the present. The life and work of Jeremiah as pertains to the writing of these books as well as his preaching will be a focus. Special attention will be paid to the introduction including the historical, social, political, and religious backgrounds of Jeremiah.

OT 115 Ezekiel 3 Semester Hours

This course will focus on the overall message and revelation of God given to the prophet Ezekiel in a time of national and personal crisis. The student will be introduced to the notion and style of apocalyptic writing, and how it can facilitate a better understanding of biblical teaching. The preaching student will be expected to make applications of principles to Christian life, and to learn to preach effectively from book.

OT 116 Daniel 3 Semester Hours

Study of historical context, visions, messages, and their fulfillment within the history of Judah/Israel and the surrounding nations. Attention will be paid to prophecies regarding Christ, the church, and related millennial and premillennial doctrines taught in contemporary religions.

OT 117 Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Songs of Solomon 3 Semester Hours

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the wisdom literature of the Old Testament (Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and the Song of Solomon). Attention is given to the interpretation of wisdom literature in general and honing student's skills as an interpreter of the biblical texts. Students will learn the material through readings, discussion forums, course teaching and projects.

OT 118 Job 3 Semester Hours

The purpose of the course is to provide an understanding and overview of the basic message of the book of Job. The major themes, purpose, contents and function of the book are studied. The problem of theodicy as revealed in the book is compared with the problem of theodicy today.

OT 119 Psalms 3 Semester Hours

This course will study the book of Psalms with a doctrinal, devotional, and Messianic emphasis and consider the key elements necessary to interpret the various psalms through a consideration of Hebrew poetry. Primary attention will be given to major types, literary forms, historical, and theological features and give consideration to Christological interpretations of the Psalms.

OT 120 Minor Prophets I 3 Semester Hours

An introduction to and study of the pre-exilic prophets, with emphasis on their chronological, historical, political, religious, and social events that shaped their ministry and provided the impetus for their preaching. Attention is given to the rise of the writing prophets, the nature of their mission, and the character of their message for their own day and the coming of the future Messiah. Principles of interpreting prophesy will also be studied.

OT 121 Minor Prophets II 3 Semester Hours

An introduction to and study of the post-exilic prophets, with emphasis on their chronological, historical, political, religious, and social events that shaped their ministry and provided the impetus for their preaching. Attention is given to the rise of the writing prophets, the nature of their mission, and the character of their message for their own day and the coming of the future Messiah. Principles of interpreting prophesy will also be studied.

New Testament Course Descriptions

NT 103 Introduction to the New Testament 3 Semester Hours

An overview of each book of the New Testament, studying the following for each: authorship, date, purpose, brief outline, expanded outline and how the book fits into the overall scheme of redemption. Each book will be placed in its historical and cultural setting. Attention will be given to a study of the canon of the New Testament and provide students an opportunity to reflect on how we can integrate scholarly perspectives with a conviction that the New Testament is the word of God.

and ethical teaching of these books and to the relationship between Ephesians and Colossians. The background, setting, theological themes, and spiritual principles and the light they cast on the latter years of the life of Paul, their author will be studied. Special attention will be paid to the unique contribution that each epistle makes to Christian theology and mission.

NT 141 Letters of Paul 4:I & II Thesalonians 3 Semester Hours

The Thessalonian epistles detail the New Testament doctrine concerning final things. A careful English exegesis of each book will be undertaken with consideration given to the purpose, theological themes, message and historical setting of the books. Attention will be given to the principles of the Christian life from the perspective of the second coming of Christ.

NT 142 Letters of Paul 5: I & II Timothy and Titus 3 Semester Hours

An introduction to and study of the letters that Paul wrote to the evangelists Timothy and Titus. Special attention is given to issues relating to church organization, the character and responsibilities of the evangelist and his role in the church and its mission.

NT 143 Hebrews 3 Semester Hours

A careful English exegesis of the epistle of Hebrews giving special attention to the relation of the New Testament to the Old Testament and to the comparison of Christ with various Old Testament persons/ events. Introductory problems such as author, date, and purpose will also be considered.

NT 144 General Epistles 1: James, I, II& III John 3 Semester Hours

The General Epistles course studies the epistles of James and John. This study give attention to the authorship, audience, date, theological themes, and interpretive issues of each letter. A careful English exegesis of each epistle will be made with attention to present-day application. Special emphasis will be given to the historical background of these epistles.

NT 145 General Epistles 2: I & II Peter; Jude 2 Semester Hours

The General Epistles course studies the epistles of Peter and Jude. This study give attention to the authorship, audience, date, theological themes, and interpretive issues of each letter. A careful English exegesis of each epistle will be made with attention to present-day application. Special emphasis will be given to the historical background of these epistles.

NT 146 Revelation 3 Semester Hours

An introduction to and study of the book of Revelation. Special attention is given to the nature of apocalyptic literature, methods of interpretation, and historical background of the book. A careful English exegesis of this book will be undertaken. Emphasis is given to the fact that the book is centered in the gospel although it is presented in the style of apocalyptic writing

Biblical Languages Course Descriptions

BL101 Elementary Hebrew I 3 Semester Hours

A study of Old Testament Hebrew language with emphasis on forms, grammar and vocabulary to enable the student to read and exegete simple Hebrew Old Testament passages.

BL102 Elementary Hebrew II 3 Semester Hours

A continuation of the study of Old Testament Hebrew language with emphasis on forms, grammar and vocabulary to enable the student to read simple Hebrew Old Testament passages.

BL103 Elementary New Testament Greek I 3 Semester Hours

A study of the New Testament Greek language with emphasis on forms, grammar and vocabulary to enable the student to read and exegete simple Greek New Testament passages.

BL104 Elementary New Testament Greek II 3 Semester Hours

A continuation of the study of the New Testament Greek language with emphasis on forms, grammar and vocabulary to enable the student to read and exegete simple Greek New Testament passages.

BL105 Elementary Hebrew and Greek in Ministry 2 Semester Hours

A basic course in the use of biblical Hebrew and Greek and biblical language study tools in Christian ministry. This class provides sound exegetical tools for the preacher to apply his Biblical Hebrew and Greek, investigating both synchronic and diachronic meaning of words and properly exegete biblical passages.

Communication Technology Course Descriptions

CT 101 Broadcast Technology Ministries 3 semester hours

The Introduction to Communications Technology coursework familiarizes students to evangelical and edification capabilities using audio and video production and social media communication. Students will work in the GST-TV studio to produce a variety of video and audio products suited for ministry. Students will also develop introductory skills for web-design and social media as edification and outreach tools. Opportunities will be provided students to sharpen their skills in writing scripts, filming, and editing. Special emphasis is placed on creativity, writing, and the editing process.

CT 102 Social Media Ministries 3 Semester Hours

This course examines digital strategies for Christian ministry using social media as edification and outreach tools. The course undertakes a broad study of the various types of social media technologies and their practical use in outreach and local ministry. It emphasizes major social media platforms e.g. Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and the role they play in communicating the gospel. The course affords opportunities for students to create content for various social media platforms and to share Christ effectively, strategically and professionally.

Preacher Readiness Course Descriptions

PR101 Hermeneutics / Bible Interpretation 3 Semester Hours

This course provides the student with sound methods for exegesis of the biblical texts and the application of the principles of biblical interpretation. Students will be introduced to the principles, history, and methods of biblical interpretation. The course deals with fundamental considerations of grammar, vocabulary, logic and contextual setting and also with such special problems as figures of speech, poetry, typology and the literalism of dispensationalism. Students will learn how to interpret biblical passages in their historical, cultural, grammatical, and theological context using study tools and bible software. In the process, the student will be introduced to various research tools, methods, resources and practical skills for interpretation in order to appropriate the Bible in its contemporary context.

PR102 English Bible History & Translation Theory 2 Semester Hours

A study of the historical events associated with the development of the English Bible, from revelation to reception, and the translation methodologies behind the various English translations. The general themes include the development of the Old and New Testament canon, the transmission of the text, and the modern English versions of the Bible.

PR103 The Life & Work of a Preacher/Evangelist 3 Semester Hours

Primary focus involves the Scriptural duties and responsibilities of the person and his family. The additional concerns addressed include congregational and leadership relationships, various duties such as visitation and counseling, officiating weddings and funerals, financial concerns, the preacher's office, library, and continuing education. Additionally, the courses emphasizes working in large or small congregations, working with no eldership in place, working in various demographics such as metropolitan/urban or small rural areas, working as a "tentmaker" or as a "part-time" or self/secularly supported preacher/evangelist, serving as an elder or deacon in addition to being a preacher/evangelist.

PR105 Preparation & Delivery of Sermons 3 Semester Hours

Focus is on providing a practical framework for the preparation and presentations of sermons, classes, weddings, funerals, devotional talks, speeches, impromptu lessons, and other related discourses will be highlighted. Assimilation of appropriate methods and materials will be covered. Actual lesson outlines will be formulated and presented before the class and in front of a video camera. Presentations will be critiqued by the course instructor, fellow class members, and by the student themselves. Additional instruction involving the building of one's preaching library, public speaking techniques, and filing/record-keeping systems will also be emphasized. The course instructor may also elect to arrange for male students to preach/teach on a one-time appointment for a local congregation. The host congregation would be asked to submit a short, written evaluation of the student's performance.

PR107 Research Skills & Composition 2 Semester Hours

Research Skills and Composition develops the students' abilities to organize and express their ideas clearly and effectively in grammatically correct sentences. It incorporates library skills, research and critical thinking in generating, focusing, developing, researching and presenting ideas in grammatically coherent writing. Additionally, the course introduces the student to library methods, and skills, and surveys the basic procedures and resources common to research in libraries. A research paper is required.

PR108 Biblical Archaeology / Geography of Bible Lands 2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the student to better understand the historical context of the Bible. A study of archaeological research and findings and their relationship to biblical facts and teachings. Additional focus will be on the geographical and historical settings of biblical literature, including Palestine, Egypt, Mesopotamia, Asia Minor, Greece and Rome.

PR109 New Testament World: Life, Customs, and Times 2 Semester Hours

This course is a study of the culture in which New Testament characters live. The political, social, economic and religious conditions are studied. Special attention is given to the cultural impact on the spiritual lives of various religious groups.

PR110 Church History I 3 Semester Hours

Study of the church from its pre-existent state as a plan in the mind of God to the period of the falling away of the church beginning in 313 A.D. Attention will also be given to the fallen period of the church, and the developments which led up to the Reformation and Restoration movements.

PR111 Church History II 3 Semester Hours

Study of the church with an overview of events leading to and through both the Reformation (1500 A.D.) and Restoration Movement (1906 A.D.). Examination of major problems faced by the church during its restoration, various attempts at restoration, major digressions from restoration, as well as literature, dates, and important figures from the Restoration Movement.

PR112 Denominational Theology/Doctrine & Practice 2 Semester Hours

Study of major denominational teachings such as: faith only, premillennialism, miraculous gifts, instrumental music, role of women in the church, etc. Denominational origins, creeds, and practices will also be examined - particularly as they relate to the theology of the group.

PR113 Christian Ethics 3 Semester Hours

Ethical conduct in the light of Bible teaching will be studied. Some of the more relevant ethical issues of our day will be studied from a biblical perspective: abortion, transgenderism, euthanasia, war, genetic engineering with all of its facets, and similar matters.

PR114 Leaders & Congregational Change 2 Semester Hours

Focus of the course seeks to give students an understanding of how cultural, demographic, and socio-economic shifts and trends affect the local church. Changes in leadership, worship, and procedure will also be discussed and assessed.

PR116 The Preacher & His Finances 2 Semester Hours

Practical study of the unique fiscal and stewardship issues that preachers encounter. Topics covered will include IRS tax filings and exemptions, 1099 issues, retirement and savings, parsonage allowances and deductions, charitable giving, and wills.

PR119 Between the Testaments 2 Semester Hours

A survey of the history of the Jewish people from Malachi to Matthew. It includes a study of the Old Testament apocrypha and pseudepigrapha.

PR122 Introduction to Christian Counseling 2 Semester Hours

A basic introduction to Christian counseling, and not a preparatory path toward becoming a professional counselor but will train the student in more advanced listening proficiency. Upon completion, student will have a better knowledge of counseling theories and family systems therapy. Special attention will be given to developing active listening skills crucial in a counseling environment, and a working knowledge of counseling ethics.

PR123 Year 1 Practicum - PTP

1 Semester Hour

The practicum/internship is an educational strategy that links classroom learning and student interest with the acquisition of knowledge attained from experienced ministers at Polishing the Pulpit. Through direct observation, reflection and evaluation, students gain an understanding of various texts, topics, missions, and how these relate to their study. Students will submit a five-page report on his /her experiences and lessons learned.

PR223 Year 2 Practicum – PTP

1 Semester Hour

The practicum/internship is an educational strategy that links classroom learning and student interest with the acquisition of knowledge attained from experienced ministers at Polishing the Pulpit. Through direct observation, reflection and evaluation, students gain an understanding of various texts, topics, missions, and how these relate to their study. Students will submit a five-page report on his /her experiences and lessons learned.

Christian Apologetics Course Descriptions

CA101 Critical Thinking

2 Semester Hours

This course will introduce basic concepts and skills in logic and critical thinking as applied to biblical studies. It will equip students with the necessary skill sets to help them identify and evaluate logical fallacies and articulate their ideas clearly and effectively. Students will apply the critical thinking skills attained for use in their own educational and ministry settings.

CA102 Philosophy of Religion

2 semester hours

This course emphasizes various theistic views and rational grounds for belief in God, the problem of evil, and human destiny. The course surveys a broad range of religious concepts, including immortality, afterlife, evil, and miracles.

CA103 Suffering & the Human Condition

2 Semester Hours

An in-depth study of human suffering. Students will consider how to deal with personal suffering while helping others who suffer. Utilizing the Christian perspective, students will formulate a theology of suffering and create an integrative approach that will result in successful interventions with individuals and families who suffer.

CA104 Christian Evidence & Apologetics

2 Semester Hours

Study of major classical arguments for the existence of God. Related sub-topics include unbelief (varieties and causes), "problem" of evil, responses to key evolutionary arguments and "evidence." Segments of course will focus on debate and other necessary skills related to the defense of one's faith.

CA105 Personal Evangelism

2 Semester Hours

Examination of various methods of evangelism including personal evangelism, tract and written material methodologies, electronic, mass media, etc. Emphasis in personal evangelism will be placed on cultivating interest and relationships, effective settings, and establishment of Bible authority in problematic areas of study that frequently cause disagreement. Attention is also given to preparation for campaigns as well as to personal evangelism in the local church.

Christian Leadership Course Descriptions

CL102 Church Conflict & Leadership 2 Semester Hours

Detailed study of church problems and conflict. Problems facing the local church including litigation, civil rights, changes in societal morality and ethics, divorce and the changing family, and other contemporary concerns will be examined.

CL103 Congregational Leadership Development 2 Semester Hours

Focus is centered on ongoing training of current and future leaders. Close examination of examples and events in the Biblical text - including the commissioning of the apostles and the seventy by Jesus, and Paul / Barnabas' commissioned efforts on behalf of the church at Jerusalem and Antioch.

CL104 Dynamics in Congregational Maturation 2 Semester Hours

Competencies are examined and developed toward a proper nurturing and maturation of the local church, especially as it involves the role of elders and others in leadership. Focus will include congregational education & the Bible school, additional tools such as gospel meetings, seminars, lectureships, and personal evangelism.

CL105 Church Leadership & Communication 2 Semester Hours

A detailed study of interpersonal, organizational, and pastoral communication. Attention will be given to communication patterns between church leaders, as well as communication between church leaders and church members. Discussion of communication differences related to gender, socio-economic, and behavioral dynamics.

CL106 Problems Facing the Church 2 Semester Hours

Problems facing the church both from within and without will be explored. Attention will be given to cultural, theological, political, and scientific currents that provide roots for changes in the church. Subjects covered include pattern theology, the "New Hermeneutic," emotionalism, the authority of silence, worship changes, female leadership, and ecumenism. Additionally, the course seeks to give students an understanding of how cultural, demographic, and socio-economic shifts and trends affect the local church.

Christian Missions Course Descriptions

CM101 Foundational Principles of Missions 2 Semester Hours

Discussion and examination of the Scriptural basis for missions. Focus will be given to textual examples of the early growth of Christianity, and the mandate to continue the facilitation of the spread of the Gospel internationally.

CM102 Cultural Assimilation in Mission Work 2 Semester Hours

Course goals include a broadening of the students grasp of the adjustments, compromises, and learning curve involved in living, working, and developing competence and comfort in foreign cultures. Concerns addressed will include language, customs, dietary, dress, counseling and arbitrating congregational conflict.

CM103 Government, Law & Missions 2 Semester Hours

Course emphasizes challenges in missionary relations with foreign governments, compliance with foreign law, custom, legal demands and cultural barriers. Student will develop competencies in living and working in foreign societies, and in recognizing and respecting nationalistic trends and concerns.

CM104 World Religions 2 Semester Hours

A study of the world's major religions. Areas of focus will include Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, and Taoism in which students compare the core elements of religion through analysis of religious belief, and practice and theology. Instructional methods will include readings, lecture, discussion, and audiovisual media. Supplemental instruction regarding denominations encountered in foreign mission settings - such as Latter-Day Saints, Pentecostalism Adventism, and Jehovah's Witnesses. Through study of the world's major and minor religions, along with indigenous religious and cults, this course helps students understand the varieties and commonalities of the human religious experience.

CM105 Life & Work of a Foreign Missionary 2 Semester Hours

Practical study of the life and work of a missionary in both foreign and domestic settings. Areas of emphasis will include working as part of a mission team, training indigenous co-workers, assuming an established work in a mission's environment, organization and administration, challenges of minimal supervision and protracted distance from overseeing leadership, and personal spirituality.

CM106 Missions & Finances 2 Semester Hours

Course will focus exclusively on money and missions. Related areas of examination and study will include budgeting, fund-raising, stewardship, and overcoming challenges that arise when replacing lost funds or inadequate financial resources. Additional discussion will address vocational missions and "tent-making."

Christian Service Course Descriptions

CS101 Discipleship Service I 1 Semester Hour

Discipleship Service provides students with the opportunity to integrate what they learn in the classroom with practicum experience. Students are offered valuable opportunity for supervised training within the local congregation settings to gain experience and greater competency as ministry leaders. The program provides students with firsthand experience in the ministry and leadership in a local church setting. In this way, students are exposed to the diverse ministry challenges found in a dynamic, healthy, and growing church. Provides the student with practical experience and develop competencies in a broad range of roles in essential areas of local church ministry.

CS102 Discipleship Service II 1 Semester Hour

Discipleship Service provides students with the opportunity to integrate what they learn in the classroom with practicum experience. Students are offered valuable opportunity for supervised training within the local congregation settings to gain experience and greater competency as ministry leaders. The program provides students with firsthand experience in the ministry and leadership in a local church setting.
